

# Pipeline 3 Construction ‘Significant’

• *MP Says at Public Discussion*

Kevin Sorenson, MP for the Battle River - Crowfoot area was at the council chamber in the Town of Provost office on Friday morning, August 11 for come and go discussions with his constituents.

Provost was the first stop of his ‘satellite constituency office days’ followed by Hardisty that afternoon.

*The Provost News* asked Sorenson several questions.

**PN:** What have you been hearing

from your constituents as their top concerns lately?

**Kevin Sorenson:** Jobs—people are starting to see the oil patch pick up; the federal government’s payout to terrorist Omar Khadr; economy—businesses are fairly slow but seeing a pick up with oil. Federal debt, the massive deficit; Canada’s trade with the United States with President Donald Trump renegotiation of NAFTA (North American Free Trade Agreement). Trade is vital. It’s going to hurt Canada.

**PN:** Have your constituents been optimistic about some things in particular?

**KS:** Seeing Enbridge’s Pipeline 3

TransMountain pipeline being stalled). We’re going to keep pushing our prime minister to defend the project. I’m confident that it’s going to go through.

**PN:** The new NDP government in British Columbia has hired legal council to try to stop the TransMountain Pipeline that runs from Alberta through B.C., of course which has already been approved. Some people in Alberta think this province should retaliate. What could Alberta do about this apparent interference from the B.C. government?

**KS:** This project is in the best interest of the country. The difficulty is the stall, stall, stall . . . what is the cost to
