Right to Know Week Emphasizes Public's Right to Access Information

Information and Privacy Commissioner Frank Work and Service Alberta Minister Heather Klimchuk kicked off Right to Know Week 2008 with a message for the public. Right to Know Week is designed to inform and remind people that access to information is a fundamental right and is one of the cornerstones of democratic government.

Work says the public needs to know they can request information about the way government works because it is the public that supports these bodies through taxation. "Overall, the statistics in Alberta show the system works well. With the exception of a few higher profile cases, the vast majority of access to information requests are processed in a timely manner."

Work adds that the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FOIP) is designed to help people find the information they are looking for and it is not meant to be a hindrance. "The laws in Alberta clearly establish guidelines for the

public and public bodies to follow. These guidelines are not designed to stop the flow of information, they

are there to assist people in finding information."

Work says a prime example of a freedom of

information request that was clearly in the public interest is the recent decision to post restaurant inspection reports. "Those reports are now available to the public on a regular basis, and this is the direct result of an access request."

The Alberta government processed 95 per cent of all information requests on time in 2007-08 and 96 per cent of them were handled without appeal to the privacy commissioner.

As well, the Alberta government is making more information available online, including flight manifests for government




